



Transportation Infrastructure

 - Intersections, beacons, luminaires
- ITS & Technology
 - Variable message signs, traffic cameras, advisory radio
- Parking
 - Park & ride, rest areas, weigh stations
- Transit
 - Vehicles, communications
- Pathways & Trails



Transportation Plans in Pennsylvania

There are three primary transportation plans at the state and regional level:

- Transportation Improvement Program (4 Years)
- Twelve Year Program (TYP)
- Long-Range Transportation Plan (minimum 20 Years)

The TIP serves as the first 4 years of the other plans

The TYP serves as years 5-12 of the LRTP




What is the TIP?




- <u>Transportation Improvement</u> <u>Program</u>
- List of region's high priority transportation projects
- Fiscally constrained by year, costs must account for inflation
- Means for the public to have a voice in ongoing transportation planning
- Updated every two years


The TIP is a summary of the projects we plan to study/design/build during the next four years

2023-2026 SEDA-COG MPO TIP Summary






Projects by Status (270 total projects)



Draft 2023-2026 TIP Funding Sources







PennDOT Connects

PennDOT Connects is PennDOT's policy committed to collaborative planning in the transportation planning process. PennDOT Connects requires collaboration with MPO/RPO staff and local government planners/staff on all proposed projects during planning. Collaboration provides the opportunity for details unique to communities to be identified and discussed for each project in planning, prior to developing project scopes and cost estimates. Additional detail on PennDOT Connects is included throughout DM-1A.




- Central Susquehanna Valley Transportation Project: Snyder/Union/Northumberland Counties
- State Route 120 Restoration and Slide Repair in Noyes Township, Clinton County
- State Route 35 Restoration, Signal, and Drainage Upgrades in Fermanagh Township, Juniata County
- State Route 22 & 322 Restoration (Lewistown Narrows) in Mifflin and Juniata counties
- State Route 522 Restoration in Lewistown Borough and Derry/Decatur Townships, Mifflin County

- State Route 339 Resurfacing and Bridge Replacement in Mifflin Township, Columbia County



How does the TIP Change?

- The TIP is updated every two years
 - This comment period is part of an update comprising projects with funding over the years 2023-2026
 - Input for the next update is considered on a rolling basis. See <u>www.talkpatransportation.com</u> for more on the modernized public involvement process.
- The TIP can be changed between updates
 - New projects can be added as funding is made available
 - Ongoing projects can change (cost overruns/savings, project deferrals, project cancellations)

What happens to your comments?



- You will receive a response from SEDA-COG. Comments are forwarded to the MPO to be included with other information about the TIP when they consider it for adoption.
- The MPO may consider changes based on your comments, if appropriate.
- Your comments will be considered when we're developing candidate projects at the beginning of the next TIP update (summer 2023).
- You will be notified of ongoing activities related to the TIP using the contact information provided with your comments so that you can stay involved.
- The MPO and PennDOT may also consider these comments as funds become available to add projects to the current TIP.
- This is your chance to let the members of the MPO and other decision makers know what you think the important transportation projects and issues are in our area!

2023-2026 TIP Schedule

- May 23: Close public comment period
- June 10: SEDA-COG MPO meeting to adopt TIP
- June 10: SEDA-COG submits TIP to PennDOT
- August: State Transportation Commission Approval
- September: Federal Highway Administration & Federal Transit Administration Approval
- October 1st: New TIP takes effect



Bipartisan Infrastructure Law

- Provides additional \$4 billion to PA from 2022-26
- Provides additional \$126 million to SEDA-COG
 MPO area from 2022-26
- Need to match federal funds with 20% state funds
- Several new programs
- Guidance still being released
